

Key Messages

Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope you were excited to read the news about our new site relayed by our Chair of Governors, Mary Karaolis, and Colin Mackinlay, the Trust's CEO, in our newsletter last week. It will be wonderful to see tangible evidence of movement towards our new site when the preparations start towards the end of this current term. We are hoping to generate excitement within our students with art projects to decorate the hoardings that will go up around areas where preparation work is taking place. Working towards our new site will be a unifying force for our school and local community.

Whole school events are a unifying force in themselves. St Andrew is regaining our sense of year group and school community following COVID with an increasing number of in person year group assemblies and whole staff events. We are continuing to use the online parents evening system as feedback from parents and staff indicate that this a really efficient and effective way of working for these events; however, being with others in a shared community experience is absolutely key. Sports Day this past week was one of those whole school events that brings everyone

together and it was wonderful to see the community, competition and camaraderie displayed by students and staff alike. Thank you to the PE department and the wider staff for the organisation of this event. As they get a taste of assessments, Year 11 and Year 13 finish their examinations, and we now look forward to celebrating their journey with us with their proms. Information on results days for these year groups will be sent out before the end of term, and key members of our staff will be in school on those days to support students as they transition to our sixth form or on to university, apprenticeship or career.

Please can I remind you that if you drop your child off by car, the school does not open until 8.10am. As we move to our new build, we will work on how we as a community can look at different, sustainable ways to travel to school. I visited one of our other Trust schools recently in its new build. The work that it had done in the lead into the new building has meant that there are consistently 75+ bikes in the bike racks each morning! Something we can strive for. Thank you to all our parents who have strived to get students to Lee Valley Sports Stadium and school on time this week despite the rail and tube strikes.

Whilst we were at our sports day, we did not get a chance to mark Windrush Day, but we will next week as Year 9 have an event, which was prompted by a group of students who presented to our senior leaders recently. A letter will be going out to Year parents on this, and I will share feedback from the event.

The Call of the Disciples - Second Sunday of Matthew & Pentecost



Second Sunday after Pentecost

"Calling of the First Apostles"

It is the second Sunday after Pentecost. The Gospel Reading from (Matthew 4:18-23), speaks about calling the first Apostles. The calling of Simon Peter and his brother Andrew and Jacob the son of Zebedee and his brother John. Last "All Saints Sunday", in where we Sunday was commemorated all the Saints in the Orthodox Church, whether they are known officially or unknown or their sainthood has not yet been announced. We celebrate All the Saints after Pentecost to acknowledge that the "The Holy Spirit" is the one who makes Saints. He is the source and fountain of holiness, He gives the spirit of Holiness and He is the one that blesses the faithful and makes them "Saints".

The second Sunday after Pentecost also shows us the work of the Holy Spirit and his acts in the Church by inviting dedicated workers to the Apostolic mission.

This coming Sunday's Gospel shows us the start of Christianity, which grew from a very small group. Twelve Apostles were invited to be of humble service to each other; they were mostly fishermen of no education, knowledge or social status. They were men living on the outskirts of Lake Tiberias actively fishing. Interestingly, when Jesus called the first Apostles, they were not unemployed, or out of work. They were preoccupied with their work. "They were throwing their nets at sea".

The Lord Jesus called them and as the Bible says: "Immediately they left the nets and followed him", they didn't hesitate to leave their livelihood and their lives to follow Jesus. He did not promise riches, position or status to them, He said one sentence: "Follow me, and I will make you

fishers of men". The same scenario is repeated with John and Jacob, the sons of Zebedee; they were fixing their nets with their father. "Immediately they left the boat, their father, and followed Him." It seems that these pupils did not hesitate for a second to become missionaries, that is, the "fishers of men." What calls for attention on this first Sunday after Pentecost, is that first and second calls were to two brothers; that is two persons from the same family were called to serve the Lord. These Apostles and others were given but one commandment by Jesus, "go make disciples of all Nations".

On Pentecost, the Holy Spirit gave them grace and wisdom, understanding and strength, that was not of this world, but from above, God's abundance. The strength, which gave the disciples the power of Evangelism, to reach Rome and other extremities of the earth like, India and Africa; to preach Christ who has risen from the dead! Every baptised Christian, who has received the Holy Chrism, is called to serve the Lord by their talents, abilities, and resources. Certainly, there are callings through the mysteries of the Holy Priesthood or through the ascetic vows; however everyone is invited to be a disciple of Jesus, to take his place in the Evangelism. All from their baptismal day are dedicated to the Lord, "All ye who have been baptised unto Christ; have put on Christ."

When we say "Yes" to the Lord, it means that we should say "No" to the things of importance of this world. We are called to abandon the Nets that tie us to the things of this world, which prevent us from following Christ. The traps of this world are many, with multiple deceptions, however it was Jacob and his brother John, who were "Fixing the nets" when the Lord called them and "they left everything and followed Him." All are called according to their talents and ability to meet the Lord's calling, to become a fisher of men, to pursue them, so they know the true God and His Heavenly Kingdom.

Subject teachers will be providing details of revision topics via the student portal on Bromcom.

For students in Year 12, all assessments will be completed in exam conditions. Subject teachers will be providing the dates and details of the topics to their classes as some will involve more than one paper. These will be completed during their timetabled lessons.

The results for the assessments will be published on to the My Child at School application towards the end of term.

A Reminder For Parents and Carers

The national routine childhood immunisation programme has a direct positive impact on the health and wellbeing of children and communities and is vital to reduce the spread of infection and prevent outbreaks.

In addition to the flu and COVID-19 vaccines that have been offered to school-aged children this academic year, teenagers are routinely offered 3 vaccines in secondary schools:

human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine in Years 8 and 9

menACWY vaccine in Year 9


Td/IPV (3-in-1 booster) in Year 9

The delivery of these routine adolescent immunisation programmes has been significantly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic and vaccine coverage is still not at prepandemic levels. The UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) and NHS England and NHS Improvement (NHSEI) are reminding parents and carers about the important protection these immunisations provide. They are also encouraging take up and catch up of vaccinations for anybody who has missed out.

Education and childcare settings have a vital role to play in supporting the routine immunisation programme. It would be very helpful for settings to share information with parents. Further information can be found in the UKHSA immunisation guidance.
