Our Progress 8 score has been confirmed as +0.24. This is a measure of how much progress students make in eight different subjects between the end of Key Stage 2 (Year 6) and the end of Key Stage 4 (GCSE exams). Our results are in the above average range and compares favourably to the schools in the boroughs of Barnet, Enfield and Haringey that we serve. We are incredibly proud of our class of 2022 who achieved some wonderful results this year and of our staff team

who worked so hard to support them to reach their full potential.

Looking ahead to our examination year groups this year, staff members are putting on a number of revision sessions for students in Years 11 and 13 this half term. This really supports those students who attend this targeted intervention.

Part of our students' success is the pastoral care we provide and one of our unique selling points. We believe that a school where every child is known and cared for provides stability for families, not least at a time of political turmoil and a cost-of-living crisis, which threatens to plunge thousands of people into difficulties this winter. Please be assured of our continued steadfast care for your children, and for our wider community. It is a pleasure and a privilege to serve you all.

Faith- πίστη

Feast of the Holy and Glorious Great Martyr Saint Demetrios, the Myrrh-Streamer



In the week ahead, we prepare to celebrate and commemorate the feast day of St Demetrios, which is always marked on 26th October.

This wonder working saint was born in Thessalonica of noble and devout parents.

Implored of God by childless parents, Demetrius was their only son, and so was raised and educated with great care. Demetrius's father was a commander in Thessalonica.

When his father died, Emperor Maximian appointed Demetrius as commander in his place. As he appointed him, Maximian, an opponent of Christ, particularly recommended that he persecute and exterminate the Christians in Thessalonica. Demetrius not only disobeyed the emperor but openly confessed and preached the Lord Jesus Christ in the city of Thessalonica. When the emperor heard of this, he became furious with Demetrius. Then, when he was returning from battle against the Sarmatians, Maximian stopped at Thessalonica to investigate the matter.

The emperor summoned Demetrius and questioned him about his faith. Demetrius openly acknowledged his Christian Faith to the emperor and also denounced the emperor's idolatry. Maximian cast Demetrius into prison. Knowing what was awaiting him, Demetrius gave all his goods to his faithful servant Lupus to distribute to the poor, and joyfully awaited his imminent suffering for Christ the Lord.

An angel of God appeared to him in prison, saying: "Peace be to you, O sufferer of Christ; be brave and be strong!" After several days, the emperor sent soldiers to the prison to kill Demetrius. The soldiers found the saint of God at prayer and ran him through with lances. Christians secretly took his body and buried it. Healing myrrh flowed from the body of the martyr of Christ,

curing many of the sick. Soon, a small church was built over his relics.

An Illyrian nobleman, Leontius, was afflicted with an incurable illness. He hastened, with prayer to the relics of St Demetrius and was completely healed. In thanksgiving, Leontius erected a much larger church on the site of the old church. The saint appeared to him on two occasions.

When Emperor Justinian wanted to translate the relics of the saint from Thessalonica to Constantinople, flaming sparks sprang from the tomb and a voice was heard: "Stop, and do not touch!" And thus, the relics of St. Demetrius have remained for all time in Thessalonica.


Ms Helan (Deputy Head Curriculum)

This term we have particularly enjoyed leading on the Open Evening and hearing all the lovely feedback from families about their experience of our students and our wonderful staff. This week all the children who visited will receive a letter from us both, thanking them for their visit and sending them a small gift of a 'Smiggle' times-table pencil to help them with their learning. It was lovely to see so many siblings here that evening, and we look forward to receiving lots of them next year. Also this term, as we are the strategic lead for many of the systems and processes that make a school run efficiently, we have been reviewing current practice. We are very much looking forward to working with teachers and parents to improve the experience for our learners.

Cognitive Science for Parents and Carers

Staff and students at St Andrew have recently been learning about how people learn.

This is called cognitive science. It helps us and students to understand what we and they can do to help them to learn but also to revise and retain the learning.



What is cognitive science?

If we think about how our minds work, we have two important areas to focus on:

First is the **working memory**. When we try to remember a phone number or a code, and we instantly forget it, that is because our working memories cannot retain more than 4 or 5 new items at once. Our working memories are like a post-it note — small and easily thrown away. When we put too much information in our working memories, that is cognitive overload and we become confused or feel overwhelmed with the learning and we retain very little of it.

The good news is that our **long-term memories** are seemingly infinite. This is where our knowledge and skills are stored: like how to ride a bike or song lyrics we'll never forget. Our grandparents' telephone numbers. Something we have practised over and over – like times tables or the alphabet.

To help students learn best, we need to help students to move the new learning from their working memories into the long-term memories. We also know that forgetting is all part of the learning process – if we forget something but then remember it, we are more likely to remember it for longer.

How does this affect teaching and learning?

To help students learn, and retain the learning, we chunk the learning into bite-sized pieces; we do lots of practice; reducing the possibility of cognitive overload by reducing how much we teach students, how we present new learning and the classroom environment (by reducing noise and distraction); we do retrieval practice which is where we ask students, through quizzes or classroom activities, to remember learning from a week ago, a month ago, a year ago. We ask lots of questions to students to make them think hard, as we know that when we think hard, we remember better. We repeat learning so students are reminded of

it and so it embeds further. We use **images** to help students link their learning and build mental models.

How can you help your child to learn better?

First of all, ask them, 'What did you learn about today?' because retrieving that learning helps it to embed. Ask more questions about it to deepen their retrieval!

Ensure they have a **quiet space** to study, far away from their phones. We know that our minds can only attend properly to one thing at once so we have to remove all distractions if we are to learn properly. That includes music!

Test them – ask them for their books or a useful website and give them quizzes – this helps them to remember and is far better for their memories than simply rereading information.

Encourage them to **practise the learning** — revision cannot be simply reading: revision must be condensing notes, doing past paper questions, exam papers, redoing answers to questions they did in lessons and improving them. Quizzes, mind maps, flashcard-making and testing are far more effective than simply rereading. There are websites that help with this, such as Memorise. Our Maths department uses Doctor Frost, other departments use Seneca.

And finally, share with them things that helped you to remember learning, such as mnemonics, silly rhymes, using images... anything that helps hook the learning into their long-term memories!

Flu vaccination campaign for years 7, 8 and 9



The NHS has written to schools to update them on changes to the national flu vaccination programme. Please see the contents of their letter below:

We have recently been informed that the flu programme will now include the school years 7, 8 and 9 from September this year.

Early information from the flu season in Australia, shows flu has been circulating earlier than expected and has been affecting younger age groups, therefore DHSC has taken steps to include these age groups in the 2022/23 vaccination campaign. Sessions for flu vaccination have already been planned and confirmed for primary schools so providers will be working with you to arrange additional dates to ensure vaccination can be offered to your students. It is likely that this will be from November onward once additional vaccine supply is available.

We would be very grateful if you could remind parents that their children are entitled to free flu vaccination on the NHS. This vaccine will be provided by a school aged vaccination team that visits the school and is given as a nasal spray. This form of the vaccine is very easy to administer and is especially well suited to preventing onward spread of infection.

The vaccine protects the child against the four main strains of influenza predicted to be in circulation this winter. Young children catch influenza very easily.

Children can spread the infection for up to 7 days, which is longer than in adults, therefore vaccinating children reduces the risk of influenza for family members, teaching staff and other children.

In school, children will be mixing with large numbers of other children in a confined environment, which increases the risk of germs (virus and bacteria alike) spreading. Vaccination builds children's immunity to protect against illnesses.

Vaccines stop influenza germs being spread, thus protecting the very vulnerable children and those in the wider community who may not have, or may not be able to develop, immunity.
