Faith- πίστη



Last Sunday (11 June) was the Feast Day of St Barnabas, an early Christian whose dramatic conversion and missionary activity are described in detail in the Acts of the Apostles. In the biblical sources, he is described as a Levite who renounced his worldly possessions in order to follow in the footsteps of the apostles (Acts 4:36-37). After travelling and preaching extensively with Saint Paul in Antioch, he is said to have proceeded on his own to Cyprus, all the while continuing to extol the message of Jesus of



Nazareth. He is traditionally thought to have been martyred in Salamis in 61 C.E.

Barnabas is notable among the Christian saints for his extensive presence in the biblical record, where his missionary efforts are described in considerable detail.

When Paul returned to Jerusalem after his conversion, Barnabas took him and introduced him to the apostles (9:27); it is possible that they had been fellow students in the school of Gamaliel. Regardless of their potential historical connection, the biblical record suggests to readers that Barnabas was responsible for encouraging the early community to accept their former persecutor into their ranks, as it describes how he "'took him [Paul] by the hand' and vouched for him among the other apostles."

Barnabas was sent to Antioch. When he arrived and saw the evidence of the grace of God, he was glad and encouraged them all to remain true to the Lord with all their hearts. He was a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and faith, and a great number of people were brought to the Lord (Acts 11:22-24).

Shortly after his return, Barnabas and Paul were appointed as missionaries to Asia Minor, and in this capacity, they visited Cyprus and some of the principal cities of Pamphylia, Pisidia, and Lycaonia (Acts 13:14). During their travels in Asia Minor, the spiritual charisma of the duo was such that they were mistaken for Hellenic deities(!) by the native Lystrans, who saw Paul as Hermes and Barnabas as Zeus, and attempted to offer sacrifice to them (14:12). Returning from this first missionary journey to Antioch, they were again sent up to Jerusalem to consult with the church there regarding the role of Gentiles in the inchoate ecclesiastical order (Acts 15:2; Galatians 2:1). According to Gal. 2:9-10, the earliest church leaders (James, Peter, and John) decreed that they would continue to preach to the Jews, with Barnabas and Paul serving the needs of the Gentiles—with the proviso that neither contingent could renege on Jesus' commitment to the poor.

Martyrdom & Death

Though the biblical record does not describe the circumstances of the saint's demise, early Christian legends contend that he was ultimately undone in his attempts to minister to the Jews of Salamis (in Cyprus).

In the centuries after Barnabas' death, a monastery was built in his name at Salamis, Cyprus, over the tomb

reputed to hold his remains (ca. AD 488). In commemoration of his extensive missionary labours in his home country, Barnabas is venerated as the Patron Saint of Cyprus.

Barnabas is remembered, too, as the Saint of 'second chances': his success in persuading the other apostles to forgive and to accept that Paul's conversion to Christianity was genuine was hugely important for the successful growth of the early Church.



Online Safety

We understand, as you will also, how difficult it can be for young people to navigate the online world and social media. For all its benefits there are also dangers for teenagers as they encounter other people online. A particular danger to all students is navigating dangers while gaming where they can interact with unknown people.

During PSHE lessons and in form time we discuss and explore how students can stay safe while being online, however we know that parents also have a need and a desire to be aware of new online dangers and current trends which may not be immediately obvious as harmful.

Consequently, we are working with a company called Smoothwall to provide regular online safety updates to parents over the course of this academic year. Anti-Bullying

All our form tutors, Heads of Year and indeed all adults in the school are training in how to identify, report and respond to signs of bullying. We have robust procedures and policies in school which we follow to ensure that we reduce and remove this from our community.

One of our values in school is respect and we expect all students to show respect to each other.

However sometimes these signs in school can be very subtle initially and it can be difficult for adults to spot these signs. We also know that some students would be concerned about their teachers knowing that this is happening.

When issues of bullying or unkindness occur in school, we address this in sensitive and appropriate ways. This can include closer monitoring or dealing with the issue in a way that reduces rather than aggravates the situation.

If your child has reported any unkindness to you that you are concerned about, please do report this to us using our staff contact form and we can discuss how we can support your child in the most appropriate way with a discussion between you, as parents, initially, so we can agree on a way forward.

School Uniform

We are incredibly proud of our students and the way that they present themselves to our community. We do this by 'sweating the small stuff' when it comes to uniform, and this ensures that larger behaviour issues are less common. The aim of our uniform policy is to ensure that all students look professional, are ready to work in school and be prepared for the world of work after they leave us.

Please do support the school culture and ethos by helping us ensure that students have the correct uniform. In particular:

- Students should not wear any jewellery or

piercings other than a single stud in each ear lobe.

- Students should be wearing neutral trainer socks or no socks with tights.
- Students should also have their shirt tucked in, top buttons done up and ties tied correctly.



If students arrive to school in incorrect uniform, they could be asked to return home to change and return immediately or failure to follow clear and reasonable instructions to address their uniform could result in students being detailed or placed in our Referral Room.

Mobile Phones



We would like to remind parents that the use of mobile phones is prohibited during the school day, and students should not use them to communicate with anyone including parents. This is

to ensure that our students can concentrate on their learning without distractions and to maintain a positive learning environment.

Our school has a strict policy on mobile phone use, and we expect all students to adhere to this policy. Mobile phones must not be visible or used during the school day, including breaks and lunchtime. Any mobile phones that are seen or heard will be confiscated by the school staff and returned to the student at the end of the school day. If this happens twice, parents should expect to come and collect the phone from the school office.

We understand that mobile phones can be important for staying in touch with parents and guardians, particularly in emergencies. However, we have systems in place to ensure that students can communicate with parents in case of emergency. Parents can contact the school office, and we will make sure that the message is relayed to the student. We encourage parents to use this system rather than contacting their child directly during the school day.

We believe that the mobile phone ban is essential to create a positive learning environment where students can concentrate on their studies without distractions. Mobile phones can be a significant source of distraction, and we want to ensure that our students have the best possible chance of success in their academic studies.

Sun Safe Advice for Schools

Pupils spend around 190 days of the year in schools and can often spend a lot of time outdoors. Therefore, it is important that schools ensure children are safeguarded from UV damage. With the rise in temperature, we are circulating useful sun safety advice:

Please review the above advice. Also, there is a handy 'Beat the Heat' poster to download and share with families. Some key points to remember are that children aged under 6 months should be kept out of direct strong sunlight and that from March to October in the UK children should:

- cover up with suitable clothing.
- spend time in the shade, particularly from 11 am to 3 pm.
- wear at least SPF30 sunscreen.
- stay well hydrated.

Please note that the NHS recommends reapplying sunscreen every 2 hours, as the sun can dry it off the skin. Therefore, sunscreen applied before the start of school will not be sufficient for the entire school day. It is important that school staff can prevent, recognise, and treat heat exhaustion and heatstroke. Please refer to the NHS advice available here regarding the symptoms and treatment of heat exhaustion and sun stroke.

WIZZ

Recently rising in popularity among children and young people, Wizz is a social networking app that allows users to chat live with people from around the world. In similar fashion to a dating app, it facilitates conversations with people that users would not ordinary meet – but of course, making connections to individuals online bring its own self-evident potential safety issues.

While Wizz makes use of face recognition technology to assesses users' age and group them by age group – but the software is far from perfect and is no guarantee that some individuals won't attempt to exploit the app for sinister purposes. Our guide examines Wizz in detail, identifying pitfalls that parents and carers should be aware of.

In the guide you'll find tips on a number of potential risks such as catfishing, explicit content and "sextortion", and examines how trusted adults can take young people to avoid these possible threats.
