### Sunday of Zacchaeus (18 February)

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The first sign of the approach of Great Lent comes five Sundays before its beginning. On this Sunday the Gospel reading is about Zacchaeus the tax-collector. It tells how Christ brought salvation to the sinful man, and how his life was changed simply because he "sought to see who Jesus was" (Luke 19:3). The desire and effort to see Jesus begins the entire movement through Lent towards Pascha. It is the first movement of salvation.

Our Lenten journey begins with a recognition of our own sinfulness, just as Zacchaeus recognized his. He promised to make restitution by giving half of his wealth to the poor, and by paying to those he had falsely accused four times as much as they had lost. In this, he went beyond the requirements of the Law (Ex. 22:3-12).

The example of Zacchaeus teaches us that we should turn away from our sins and atone for them. The real proof of our sorrow and repentance is not just a verbal apology, but when we correct ourselves and try to make amends for the consequences of our wrongful actions.

We are also assured of God's mercy and compassion by Christ's words to Zacchaeus, "Today salvation is come to this house" (Luke 19:9).

Zacchaeus was short, so he climbed a tree in order to see the Lord. All of us have sinned and fall short of the glory of God (Rom. 3:23). We are also short in our spiritual stature, therefore we must climb the ladder of the virtues and prepare for spiritual effort and growth.

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## Changes to detentions procedures

I'd like to inform the school community of a change to our school's detention procedure, which we believe is necessary to maintain discipline and ensure the well-being of all students.

This change will only affect a minority of students, 84% of our students did not receive a single detention in the first three terms of 2023/24.





Should a student miss this 60-minute detention, they will be assigned a two-hour senior leader detention on a Friday, and should this detention be missed, this will result in students spending a day in the Referral Room the next day and sit a detention after school on that day. Parents will be informed on Friday morning via text message. You can also access detention information via the MCAS app.

This change aims to emphasise the importance of attending detentions promptly and to deter repeated infractions. Previously, missing a 60-minute detention would result in students spending two periods in the Referral Room and sitting the missed 60-minute detention the next day. Our aim with this change in procedure is to ensure that students spend more time learning in the classroom.

It is important to note that our intention behind this adjustment is not to penalise students unfairly but rather to in stil a sense of responsibility and accountability for their actions. By reinforcing the consequences of missing detentions, we can continue to

promote a culture <u>promoting</u> of respect, readiness, and responsibility, the school's code of conduct, within our school community.
