

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## Faith - Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee (25 February)

The Sunday of the Publican and Pharisee begins the Lenten Triodion, the liturgical book used in the services of Great Lent. It is the Sunday after the Sunday of Zacchaeus and Sunday before Sunday of the Prodigal Son.


This is the pre-Lenten start of the Easter cycle of worship in the Orthodox Church.

The focus this Sunday is on the Gospel of Luke 18:10-14, in which two men went to the Temple to pray. One was a Pharisee, an externally decent and righteous man of religion, and the other was a publican, a sinful tax-collector who was cheating the people. Though the Pharisee was genuinely righteous under the Law, he boasted before God and was condemned. The publican, although he was truly sinful, begged for mercy, received it and was justified by God.

On this Sunday in the preparation for Great Lent, Orthodox Christians are to see that they have not the religious piety of the Pharisee, but the repentance of the publican. They are called to think about themselves, in the light of Christ's teaching, as they really are and to beg for mercy. 'For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and everyone who humbles himself will be exalted.' (Luke 18:14).

INTERNATIONAL GREEK LANGUAGE DAY

THERE ARE INFINITE REASONS TO LEARN GREEK

WHICH ONE WILL BE YOURS?

February 9, commemoration day of the Greek national poet, Dionysios Solomos (April 8, 1798 – February 9, 1857), was established after a ministerial decision as International Greek Language Day, with the aim of highlighting the fundamental role of the Greek language in European and world culture. The value of the Greek language is reflected in its historicity and timelessness. As Linguistics Professor G Babiniotis emphasizes, the Greek language is a language "that has been spoken continuously for 40 centuries. While for 28 centuries it has been written with the same script and the same Greek alphabet and for 24 centuries it has been written with the same spelling". This continuity of the Greek language is what connects us with the speech of Plato and Aristotle, with the language of the texts of Homer and Aeschylus, with the language of Thucydides, Herodotus and Plutarch, with the language of Hippocrates, even with the language of the New and Old Testament, the language of Chrysostom, Gregory and Basil, to dwell only on these.

The Greek language is witnessed, to a large extent, sometimes orally and sometimes in writing, unbroken to this day, having undergone many changes. Having been cut off from the Indo-European language family and its early forms, the Greek language went

undergone many changes. Having been cut off from the Indo-European language family and its early forms, the Greek language went through many stages, most famously the dominance of the Attic dialect and the emergence of many other dialects, the spread of the Hellenistic common and its use in Greek literature, the medieval — Byzantine, which combined the Attic dialect and several elements of modern Greek and finally modern Greek, as we know it today.

On this celebration, a series of actions were carried out in our school according to the age and abilities of our students in order to inform and raise awareness about the importance of the Greek language.

All classes watched a presentation about the reasons why people worldwide are learning the Greek language today looking for their own reason to learn Greek. In the Greek lesson, references were made to the ideograms or pictographs of Linear B or Mycenaean writing, the Phoenician alphabet, which was introduced by the Phoenicians to Greece and then significantly changed by the Greeks

creating the Greek alphabet. A very interesting application of the

Museum of Thebes in Greece http://games.mthv.gr/mth-names/ was used via the internet which enabled some students to see how their name was spelled in antiquity from the Mycenaean Era to Byzantium.

Opinions of foreign important men of letters on the timeless value of the Greek language were read and curiosities of the Greek language were pointed out, such as the longest Greek word in literature by Aristophanes in his comedy Ecclesiazouses in verses 1169-1175.

Finally, after watching a tribute to the history and contribution of the Greek language to global linguistic culture, they played a creative game in their class. They were given flashcards of Greek words that have entered the English language as well as their English equivalents to note the differences and realize that they know as many Greek words as they do English!

For example, astronomy → astornomia, mathematics → mathimatica etc.

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## **Changes to detentions procedures**

I'd like to inform the school community of a change to our school's detention procedure, which we believe is necessary to maintain discipline and ensure the well-being of all students.

This change will only affect a minority of students, 84% of our students did not receive a single detention in the first three terms of 2023/24.

From the week beginning the 4 March, we will be implementing changes to our detention procedure.



Should a student miss this 60-minute detention, they will be assigned a two-hour senior leader detention on a Friday, and should this detention be missed, this will result in students spending a day in the Referral Room the next day and sit a detention after school on that day. Parents will be informed on Friday morning via text message. You can also access detention information via the MCAS app.

This change aims to emphasise the importance of attending detentions promptly and to deter repeated infractions. Previously, missing a 60-minute detention would result in students spending two periods in the Referral Room and sitting the missed 60-minute detention the next day. Our aim with this change in procedure is to ensure that students spend more time learning in the classroom.

It is important to note that our intention behind this adjustment is not to penalise students unfairly but rather to instil a sense of responsibility and accountability for their actions. By reinforcing the consequences of missing detentions, we can continue to

promote a culture promoting of respect, readiness, and responsibility, the school's code of conduct, within our school community.
